




BACKGROUND

As a pioneering dental education institution, the college has its objectives as:


- To teach and train undergraduate and post graduate students, the knowledge, skills, and attitude necessary to become competent dentists in oral and dental health care.

CURRICULUM DESIGN, DEVELOPMENT and CONTENT

The existing curriculum has well defined outcomes of the program but does not have any defined competencies for the students. However, realizing the need, the college is now seriously focusing on development of competencies for students at different levels of education and then at graduation to produce dentists who can safely serve community and compete with other dentists elsewhere or can pursue post graduate studies at international dental schools and universities.

The following steps are implemented and are in progression in the institution to think students "out of the box" and to survive the competencies.

- Use of magnifying loops and microscopes during clinical hours
- Integration of clinical postings for I and II BDS students
- Mentor mentee programme with certified psychologist to monitor the student's progress
- Integration of English language classes in curriculum for I BDS to improve the communication skills and also break the barriers of communication
- Research methology programme for I BDS students initiated with a view to inculcate seeds of research activities at an infant stage.
- A certified course of BLS (Basic Life Support) programme is conducted every year to students and staff
- With an aim to propagate the knowledge of radiology to all the specialities, we have started conducting workshops on oral and maxillofacial radiology to all the post graduate students and staff which includes lectures, demonstration of techniques and interpretation of radiographs.




- Advanced customized software, Dental College Automation Package (DCAP) is in progress which enables students, faculty, parents and management with monitoring and tracking capabilities.
- Teaching is carried out based on module content learning which include three modular sessions in an academic year.Small group teaching is in practice for betterunderstanding of concept and to have an interaction among students and faculty.
- E-Learning is established for students.



DENTAL COUNCIL OF INDIA B.D.S COURSE REGULATONS





DURATION OF THE COURSE: The undergraduate dental training programme leading to BDS degree shall be of 4 years with 240 teaching days in each academic year consisting of 8 working hours including lunch break of 1 hour per day. The minimum working days indicated each year does not include 1 month vacation and 1 month of University exams. During this period, the student shall be required to have engaged in full time study at a dental college recognized or approved by the Dental Council of India.

COMPULSORY ROTATORY INSTERNSHIP: As per the 3rd Amendment (Page 7) regulations of the DCI revised course, 2011. Every candidate after passing the Final BDS examination has to undergo one year paid rotating internship in a dental college. The BDS degree shall be granted only after completion of the internship.

MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION: English shall be the medium of instruction of study and examinations of the Bachelor of Dental Surgery Course.

ATTENDANCE:

- (i) 75% in theory and 75% in practical / clinical in each year.
- (ii) (ii) In case of a subject in which there is no examination at the end of the academic year / semester, the percentage of attendance shall not be less than 70%. However, at the time of appearing for the professional examination in the subject, the aggregate percentage of attendance in the subject should satisfy condition (i) above.
- (iii) The attendance will be calculated from the day the course commenced and not from the day of admission of the student. If a student is admitted later than 30 days after the commencement of the course, he/she will continue the course along with the batch but will appear for the subsequent examination. The candidate will have to complete the curriculum, which was lost and certified by the Head of the department and institution to that effect.
- (iv) The detained and referred students of B.D.S course are required to put in a minimum of 75% of attendance in theory and practicals separately during the 6 months tenure before the subsequent exam. (v) If a student absents continuously for a period of 91 days or more and seeks permission to attend the course before one year, he /she may be permitted by the Principal conditionally after forwarding the application to the Registrar

with the Principal's remarks. If the Vice-Chancellor is satisfied of the reasons, he may grant leave of absence attaching such conditions, as he may deem necessary. Candidates who are absent for a period of one year or more without permission, shall be deemed to have forfeited the admission to the course and his /her studentship shall stand cancelled without any further notice.

INTERNAL ASSESSMENT:

The continuing assessment examinations will be held frequently at least 3 times in a particular year and the average marks of these examinations should be considered. 10% of the total marks in each subject for both theory, practical and clinical examination separately should be set aside for the internal assessment examinations. The referred and detained students are also required to appear for a minimum of one internal assessment examination in theory and practical / clinical in the subjects concerned. New assessment marks are to be taken for the declaration of the results. If the candidate is absent for any of the examinations, the marks in that shall be treated as zero. Internal assessment examination will include MCQ's.

SCHEME OF UNIVERSITY EXAMINATIONS:

The scheme of examination for B.D.S. Course shall be divided into 1st B.D.S. examination at the end of the first academic year, 2nd B.D.S. examination at the end of second year, 3rd B.D.S. examination at the end of third year and final B.D.S. at the end of 4th year. 240 days minimum teaching in each academic year is mandatory.

1st B.D.S. Examination:

- 1. Anatomy including embryology and histology
- 2. Human Physiology, Biochemistry & Nutrition
- 3. Dental Anatomy, Embryology and Oral Histology

Any student who does not clear the first BDS University Examination in all subjects within 3 years from the date of admission, shall be discharged from the Course. Any candidate who fails in one subject in an Examination is permitted to go to the next higher class and appear for the subject and complete it successfully before he/she is permitted to appear for the next higher examination.

2nd B.D.S. Examination:

A candidate who has successfully completed the 1st B.D.S examination can only appear for the 2nd B.D.S Examination.

- 1. General Pathology and Microbiology
- 2. General and Dental Pharmacology and therapeutics
- 3. Dental Materials
- 4. Pre Clinical Conservative Only Practical and Viva Voce
- 5. Pre Clinical Prosthodontics Only Practical and Viva Voce

Any candidate who fails in one subject in an examination is permitted to go to the next higher class and appears for the said failed subject and complete it successfully before he/she is permitted to appear for the next higher examination.

3rd B.D.S. Examination:

A candidate who has successfully completed the 2nd B.D.S. examination can only appear for the 3rd B.D.S Examination.

- 1. General Medicine
- 2. General Surgery
- 3. Oral Pathology and Oral Microbiology

Any candidate who fails in one subject in an examination is permitted to go to the next higher class and appears for the said failed subject and complete it successfully before he/she is permitted to appear for the next higher examination.

Final B.D.S. Examination:

A candidate who has successfully completed the 3rd B.D.S examination can only appear for the 4th B.D.S Examination.

- 1. Oral Medicine and Radiology
- 2. Paediatric & Preventive Dentistry
- 3. Orthodontics & Dentofacial Orthopaedics
- 4. Periodontology.
- 5. Prosthodontics and Crown & Bridge
- 6. Conservative Dentistry and Endodontics
- 7. Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery
- 8. Public Health Dentistry

Only those candidates who have passed in all the subjects in Final BDS examination will be allowed for the compulsory paid rotatory internship.

WRITTEN EXAMINATION:

- 1. The written examination in each subject shall consist of one paper of three hours duration and shall have maximum marks of 70.
- In the subjects of Physiology & Biochemistry and Pathology & Microbiology each paper will be divided into two parts, A and B of equal marks.

PRACTICAL AND CLINICAL EXAMINATION:

1. Objective Structured Clinical Evaluation:

The present system of conducting practical and clinical examination at several universities provide chance for unrealistic proportions of luck. Only a particular clinical procedure or experiment is usually given for the examination. The clinical and practical examination should provide a number of chances for the candidate to express one's skills. A number of examination stations with specific instructions to be provided. This can include clinical procedures, laboratory experiments, spotters etc. Evaluation must be made objective and structured. The method of objective structured clinical examinations should be followed. This will avoid examiner bias because both the examiner and the examinee are given specific instructions on what is to be observed at each station.

2. Records / Log Books:

The candidate should be given credit for his records based on the scores obtained in the record. The marks obtained for the record in the first appearance can be carried over to the subsequent appearances if necessary.

3. Scheme of Clinical and practical examinations:

The specific scheme of clinical and practical examinations, the type of clinical procedures / experiments to be performed and marks allotted for each are to be discussed and finalized by the Chairman and other examiners and it is to be published prior to the conduct of the examinations along with the publication of the time table for the practical examinations. This scheme should be brought to the notice of the external examiner as and when the examiner reports. The practical and clinical examinations should be evaluated by two examiners of which one should be an external examiner appointed from other universities preferably outside the State. Each candidate should be evaluated by each examiner independently and marks computed at the end of the examination.

4. Viva Voce:

Viva Voce is an excellent mode of assessment because it permits a fairly broad coverage and it can assess the problem solving capacity of the student. An assessment related to the affective domain is also possible through viva voce. It is desirable to conduct the viva voce independently by each examiner. In order to avoid vagueness and to maintain uniformity of standard and coverage, questions can be pre-formulated before administering them to each student. Twenty marks are exclusively allotted for viva voce and that can be divided equally amongst the examiners, i.e., 10 marks per examiner.

MARKS DISTRIBUTION IN EACH SUBJECT:

11. CRITERIA FOR A PASS AND CLASSIFICATION OF RESULTS:

Fifty percent of the total marks in any subject computed as aggregate for theory, i.e., written, viva voce and internal assessment and practicals including internal assessment, separately is essential for a pass in all years of study.

For declaration of pass in a subject, a candidate shall secure 50% marks in the University examination both in Theory and Practical / Clinical examinations separately, as stipulated below:

- A candidate shall secure 50% marks in aggregate in University theory including Viva Voce and internal assessment obtained in University written examination combined together.
- In the University Practical / clinical examination, a candidate shall secure 50% of University practical marks and internal assessment combined together.
- In case of pre clinical Prosthetic Dentistry and Pre clinical conservative dentistry in II BDS where there is no written examination, minimum for pass is 50% of marks in practical and Viva Voce combined together in University examination including Internal assessment i.e. 50/100 marks.
- Successful candidates who obtain 65% of the total marks or more shall be declared to have passed the examination in First Class. Other successful candidates will be placed in Second Class. A candidate who obtains 75% and above is eligible for Distinction. Only those candidates who pass the whole examination in the first attempt will be eligible for distinction or class.
- First Class and Distinction etc. to be awarded by the University as per their respective rules.

13. PROMOTION RULES:

- a. A candidate who has not successfully completed the 1st B.D.S. examination can not appear in the 2nd year Examination.
- A candidate who has successfully completed the 2nd B.D.S. examination only can appear 3rd B.D.S. Examination.
- c. Any candidate who fails in one subject in an Examination is permitted to go to the next higher class and appear for the subject and complete it successfully before he is permitted to appear for the next higher examination.
- d. Any student who does not clear the first BDS University Examination in all subjects within 3 years from the date of admission, shall be discharged from the Course.





STUDENT MENTORSHIP AND COUNSELLING POLICY



STUDENT MENTORSHIP AND COUNSELLING POLICY


Counseling is a collaborative process that involves the development of a confidential professional relationship that focuses on personal problem. The objective of counseling is to help you clarify issues, gain insight into your feelings and thoughts and deal effectively with problems.

A student's mental health and wellbeing are very important to their success. It is counseling that the pressures on young people can affect their mental health and well being, and that young people in education can experience high levels of stress and change, and be extremely vulnerable.

The counseling works with you to help you identify your strengths, gain insight into your ways of thinking, feeling and behaving and begin a process of change and growth. Sometimes students know what they need to do but they just can't get themselves to do it! Counseling can help you understand what is getting in your way of making the changes you want in your life.

Counseling process is designed to help students developing their selfknowledge and guide them to thinking about their interests, values, competencies, and personal characteristics. Counseling can also teach you ways of dealing with stressful life events and circumstances you can't change. They'll help you analyze and respond to internal pressures and negative attitudes towards yourself or others.

Counseling provides a safe place, separate from your daily life, where you can explore issues or feelings which are causing you difficulty. The counseling will aim to relate to you in a supportive and purposeful manner and assist in the task of finding your own way forward. Your use of counseling remains confidential to the service within the limits agreed with your counseling.



Role of the counseling service in the College

- Aim of Vishnu dental College is to create a healthy and safe environment for its students and staff.
- Encouraging students with mental health difficulties to seek help.
- Meeting the support and study needs of students with mental health disabilities.
- The key task of the College is the education of its students, proving supportive environment which encourages personal development and autonomy
- The counseling service provides students with support at a time when they are most vulnerable and aims to contain the distress of vulnerable students. Also students experiencing emotional or psychological difficulties relating to academic or social problems
- Students get help from the counseling service for many reasons. These
 presenting issues may be Anxiety, stress, personal and family relationships,
 personal and sexual identity, eating problems, self harm, suicidal thoughts,
 bullying and, anger management.
- Counseling offers the opportunity for the student to talk and be heard in a safe, nonjudgmental environment
- Counseling aims to help students, through individual or group work, to feel they are in control of their own lives, able to make choices and decisions, and to put them into action
- However, the counseling service cannot take responsibility for all mental health issues arising in the College and will work together with other key staff to support students in distressing situations
- Counsellors also liaise with external agencies and maintain links with these to support the wellbeing of students. These may include GPs, local counseling services.



Entitlement to counseling:


- The Counselling Service is available to all students of Vishnu dental College.
- Short-Term Counselling may be offered to students on both a referral, and self-referral basis and after initial assessment.
- Students experiencing emotional upset, trauma or crisis also form an essential part of the student support services on offer within the College.
- Students with mental health difficulties of a more than temporary nature may benefit from the non-therapeutic support
- Student suffers a severe panic attack just before, or during, an examination.
- They fail to make satisfactory progress
- Their counseling both in the classroom and outside it can put pressure on their peers and on staff
- Deterioration in academic performance, change in appearance, or obvious mood changes such as distress or aggression.

Professional practice and standards:

- Students are entitled to expect a high quality therapeutic counseling
- Trained counseling are committed to maintaining their competence through on-going professional development.
- Counsellors must participate in continuous professional development, which may include attendance at training courses, workshops, conference or professional networking.

Confidentiality:


• The college offers the highest possible levels of confidentiality in order to respect the students privacy and create the trust necessary for counseling.



- No information about a student's counseling can be released without the student's signed permission
- All the students seeking counseling be informed of the terms of the counseling contract and the limitations of confidentiality, and agree to these before therapy begins.
- No information will be shared the student will be disclosed to anyone, not faculty or staff members, administrators, parents or other students.
- No counseling information is included in a student's academic record; and when students leave Downstate, their participation in counseling remains private.
- Counselling sessions are confidential to the student. Unless they have the student's prior consent, the counseling will not pass on to a third party any information regarding a student's attendance, their presenting issues or their
- However, in exceptional circumstances the counseling may take the decision to break confidentiality, with or without the student's consent, if necessary where in his/her professional judgement:
- There is a risk of the student seriously harming themselves or being harmed
- There is a risk of another person being harmed
- There is a risk of a serious crime being committed.

Record-keeping:

- The purpose of record-keeping is explained to all students using the counseling service.
- The student's consent to collect and record information is obtained in line with data protection legislation. Students have a right of access to all records/notes the service holds about them.



- Confidentiality of all information kept about a student is of paramount importance. All counseling records and case notes are kept securely in locked drawers in the counseling room
- Records are kept no longer than is necessary. Records are destroyed three academic years after the year in which their counseling commenced. Records are disposed of safely and securely.

Service delivery:


The Counseling Service offers the following:

- One-to-one therapeutic counseling by appointment
- Consultations with teaching and support staff to support them in their roles
- Counseling is provided in a safe and confidential environment.
- Students can self-refer or may be referred by teaching or support staff.
- Counseling sessions normally last up to 50 minutes and students normally attend on a weekly basis.
- Wherever possible, students will arrange their sessions outside of class times. If attendance during class time is unavoidable, they must seek permission from their tutor.

Monitoring and evaluation:

The counseling service is evaluated annually as part of the College's self assessment process, in line with the common inspection framework, and draws on:

- Statistical data collected monthly on levels of service take-up
- Anonymised client data reflecting the profile of service users and presenting issues



- A review form used at the start and end of the counseling process to monitor distance travelled by the student during their counseling
- Evaluation forms given to clients to complete anonymously at the end of their counseling

Complaints procedure:

- A student may make a complaint about counseling by following the grievance procedure for students which is set out in the student hand book and is available on the College website.
- A grievance against a counseling member of staff is referred to the
- Director of Quality who will investigate the matter fully and decide an outcome.
- Students who are not satisfied with the outcome of the complaint
- Investigation may appeal and details of how to do this and the relevant timescales are set out in the decision letter.

- 3. Must know how to assess oral health status, medical risk assessment and to identify the clinical findings in relation to dental pain and its management.
- 4. Must know about the Dental chair and its operation well in advance of their clinical postings.
- 5. Must learn and know about the different sterilization techniques and the principles of instrumentation well in advance of their clinical postings.
- 6. Should be able to know the basic principles of various clinical procedures.


